#### 1.1 – Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

Nazareth Margoschis College is affiliated to Manonmaniam Sundaranar university.

All the programmes taught in the college are designed by the University to which the college is affiliated and hence, all departments are required to implement the syllabus prescribed by Manonmaniam Sundaranar University. The time table committee headed by the principal and a senior faculty member draws up Academic Calendar. A detailed time table is framed for academic and co-curricular courses such as theory, practical, tutorial, ICT, life-skill, value education and add-on classes. It ensures different type of exposure to student community. Each department strives for time tested and innovative methods, that cater to the needs of the students. Each department prepared an academic calendar to help both the students and staff to accomplish their work within the available time frame, yet flexible enough to permit changes. Based on the syllabus, time table and teaching plans are prepared before the commencement of the semester. The apportioning of syllabus is done democratically through discussion with the faculty members in departmental meetings. The faculty are keen and vigilant to complete the syllabus on time. The staff council meetings are arranged by the principal regularly to monitor the progress of the departments with regard to teaching-learning. Smart classrooms and ICT facilities are extensively used by teachers in day-to-day teaching to make delivery of curriculum attractive to students. Special lectures delivered by eminent scholars on topics related to curriculum further intensify students learning experience. The formal evaluative process includes tutorials/projects, class tests and internal assessments. Students are encouraged to meet faculty after the class hours for doubt clearing and curricular discussions. Extra hours are devoted for remedial coaching to help the students face university examination successfully. The progress of teaching-learning, department meetings, parent-teachers meet, Alumnae meet and other forums are monitored by IQAC and are done necessary alterations if needed. Feedbacks are also collected from the students. In addition to this, IQAC conducts regular internal and external audits to evaluate and provide valid suggestions to solve the problems in curriculum delivery. Study tours and Field visits are organised for students to expose them to unravel mysterious part of learning. Seminars, unannounced Quiz are conducted to promote indepth learning among the students.

1.4.2 – How the feedback obtained is being analyzed and utilized for overall development of the institution?

#### Feedback Obtained

Feedback serves an analytics to figure out the opinion of the Parents, Students and Teachers about the institution. Feedback is collected from students, alumni, parents, faculties and all the other stakeholders. The faculty members are also asked to give feedback on curriculum design. The feedback received from Alumni is analyzed and used for the overall development of the institution. Feedback is received from students and faculties through Google form and Alumni feedback is received physically. Every year feedbacks from parents are collected personally in a parent-teacher meeting. In the year 2019-20, sixty feedback responses have been received from the Teachers. The feedback features questions about the balance between theory and application, objectives of syllabi, relevance of reference materials prescribed, the knowledge provided by the syllabi, whether the teacher is given full freedom to adopt new techniques of teaching such as group discussions and seminar presentations. Furthermore, The teachers are encouraged to give feedback on the availability of books in the library, whether the the curriculum has been designed in such a way to enhance the employability of the students, the applicability of the courses in real-life situation, revision of the syllabus in the reasonable interval and the skill development component of the syllabi. The Feedback Questions are asked about the receptive nature of office staff, the patience, cooperativeness and helpfulness of office staff, cooperativeness of the library staff, online educational resources in library, internet facility in library, and the availability of the prescribed material in the library. Moreover, the feedbacks are obtained from the students about the condition of equipment's in the laboratory, whether separate rooms are for girls and boys are available, the cleanliness of the classroom environment, green and eco-friendly campus, availability of hygienic and properly maintained toilets, and availability of clean drinking water in the campus. The student's feedback form also features questions regarding grievance redressal, functioning of career counseling and placement cell, usefulness of mentor system, and opportunities provided for revealing talents. There is a separate column in the feedback form about the curriculum. The students are asked questions about whether the curriculum has been designed in such way to enhance employability. The relevance and applicability of the course in real life situation is also questioned through feedback. The parents are also asked questions about their satisfaction of Admission Process, Teaching Learning process, Sports and cultural activities, Women safety, Guidance and Counseling, and Classroom Advisor's activities. Parents are also given opportunities to write their comments in the feedback form apart from the questionnaire. The feedback form feature questions in two languages: English and regional language (Tamil) to facilitate the Parents to understand the question clearly. The result obtained from parents also is reviewed and considered while making plans and decisions. The feedback form is digitally processed and analyzed to get accurate percentage-wise results with Pi-chart. Seventy responses have been collected from parents. 50 of parents responded that the admission process is good.

### 2.3.2 – Students mentoring system available in the institution? Give details. (maximum 500 words)

Yes, Students mentoring system is available in our institution. The college has instituted a comprehensive system for supporting and mentoring the students. This system helps the students to come out of the struggle that they face both in their academic and personal life. The key areas like academic, financial issues, psychological problems and their talents are identified easily through this system and the necessary assistance are provided. The college follows Departmental Mentoring system where each mentor allotted wards depending on the strength of the department. Every student will have a mentor whom they can freely approach at any time for academic and personal guidance. They are encouraged to discuss any issue of concern that comes in the way of learning and development. The mentors maintain record of the wards and all the details regarding the mentee's activities are noted in the register. Details of problems faced by the students, counselling given, academic points etc are recorded in the register. This gives a clear picture of the students and also able to study

the problems of the students. Parent - teacher meeting is conducted twice in the academic year where the student's progression and regularity to the class will be discussed with the parents. The class teachers and the course teachers analyse the academic problems to devise ways for the academic improvement. The advance learners are motivated to participate in inter collegiate competitions, present papers, attend seminars etc., similarly the problems faced by the slow learners are identified by the mentors and the guidance are given to overcome their issues and they are encouraged to improve their performance.

2.5.2 – Reforms initiated on Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level (250 words)

The college, being a non-autonomous institution, is affiliated to the Manonmaniam Sundaranar University (MSU) and strictly follows the CIE norms prescribed by them. The internal examination schedule is prepared based on the university academic calendar and is communicated to the students and faculty through College Academic calendar. There are certain reforms carried out for the betterment of CIE which includes

- Each department is liberalised to prepare their own internal schedule and invigilation duties based on the information provided in the academic calendar.
- Question Banks are prepared by the respective faculties well in advance and questions are selected from it covering the entire unit. To enable this from each units of the syllabus particulars numbers of questions are asked.
- The Question Paper and Scheme are prepared in advance and Scrutiny of the prepared question paper is carried out by Head of the Department and verified by Exam Co-ordinator to ensure quality of the Question paper.
- The Answer Scripts are evaluated within a week and the papers are distributed to the students for verification and discussion. The students are encouraged to discuss their queries with concerned staff.
- The students who face difficulty to attend the off-line exam has the freedom to appear online with prior permission from the Head of the Department. When a student abstains from writing the exams due to a valid and genuine reason, he/she is given another chance to write the exam with the consent and approval of the Head of the Department.
- The results were analysed and remedial action that need to be taken are discussed by the HOD and concerned faculty. Re-tests are also conducted for slow learners.
- The mentor discusses the result of the student to ensure continual learning and development of their children with parents.
- Suggestions for remedial measures are given if needed and monitoring it closely.

2.5.3 – Academic calendar prepared and adhered for conduct of Examination and other related matters (250 words)

The college ensures strict adherence of the time frame for CIE prescribed by the university. The institution prepares the academic calendar well in advance after collecting the required details regarding the academic activities planned by each Department individually for the year with the guidance of IQAC and is given to all the students and faculties during the beginning of the academic year. The comprehensive academic calendar is prepared by the Calendar committee consisting of the Principal and the Vice Principal and a few staff with the help of IQAC. Adhering to the college academic calendar, teaching faculties create action plan to ensure timely delivery of syllabus. The timeline created allows the staff to complete the given syllabus on time and the students will also have sufficient time before the examination to prepare for CIE. This helps to ensure effective conduct of CIE and achieve desired outcomes. It also helps the students to plan their academic and extracurricular activities. Three Internal Examinations are conducted as per the university instruction and the assignment are also given to the students to test their understanding on the subject. Apart from the Internal Examination, class test are conducted to prepare the students well for the university examination. The students are also encouraged to do mini projects as a part of their academic performance. The marks secured by the students in the tests are informed to the parents in the PTA meetings as scheduled to further improvement of the students.

The institution ensures the maintaining of the infrastructure by undertaking repairing work every year. An annual maintenance contract (AMC) has been made between local computer service centre and institution to ensure the maintenance of computer and ICT facilities. Every year computers are checked and repaired by the technicians. People from computer service centre take care of the maintenance of computers, supporting hardware, LAN and Wi-Fi across the campus. File sharing is enabled inside the campus through Local Area Network. The campus is maintained clean and tidy by the institution. All the classrooms, Staff rooms, Seminar halls and Laboratories are cleaned and maintained regularly by Non-teaching staff assigned for each area. Wash rooms and rest rooms are well maintained. The record of instruments purchased is maintained by stock register. For the maintenance of academic facilities like laboratories, classrooms, skill-related workshops, conference and seminar halls, additional budget is allocated. The playground is also maintained regularly by eradicating unwanted weeds and grass from the field. The sports facilities of the institute are maintained by physical education department. Our College has a Kabaddi Court, 2 Football grounds, an Athletic Ground, and a big sports Room containing various sports equipment for mini gym, shot put, hammer throw, high jump, pole vault and games. There are a Physical Director and a Marker man to take care of all the activities, coaching, events, tournaments / Leagues, and maintenance. Every year physical verification of the available consumable non consumable materials is done. Electrical and the Plumbing related maintenance is done with the help of skilled persons. The students are instructed to maintain the campus clean and plant trees inside the campus by NCC. The Library has a Librarian, a Library Assistant and an Attendant, responsible for the issue and maintenance of all books, records of browsing, and keeping everything in order. The Library

environment is maintained with proper procedures to provide a peaceful reading experience to the readers. Students are advised to keep the library clean by using dustbin. Students' restrooms and retiring halls are cleaned often by the assigned workers to maintain the place clean and hygiene. The Gardner takes care of the garden as well as trees with diligence to provide an eco-friendly campus. The necessary equipment, apparatus and instruments for the practical exams are installed and made available in the respective laboratories. The teachers operate them during the demonstration. A sufficient number of Laboratory Assistants are employed and they clean, maintain and keep them safe in the Laboratory. The electricity and water supply to the Laboratories are ensured by the Technician. All wiring works, electric fittings and any default correction are done by the outside Electrician.

The sports activities are carried out by the physical director. He helped and trained the students to participate in inter collegiate, inter university, national level athletic events. The library is well maintained and developed under the supervision of a librarian. Students are encouraged to visit library regularly by giving awards to the best library user. Valuable books, journals, competitive exam books and magazines are purchased for the library for the use of staff and students. Departmental industrial visits and field visits, relevant to their subjects are arranged by the staff and HODs of each department with the consent of the principal. Faculty members are appointed as the mentor for their department students. They maintain a student profile record. They periodically monitor their studies, test results and also their overall development. The care and concern of the mentors on their mentees will instil self-confidence and self-respect in them. Staff Council Committees play significant role in smooth functioning of the college. Students representative in the class also contribute to the management of the college through their active roles.

Distribution of saplings have given a craving for the students to plant flowering plants and trees in their residing places. There is a big change in their lifestyle. World Ozone Day Awareness Programme teaches the students the causes and impact of ozone hole. Thus, the institution is concerned about the natural environment and wants to improve and protect it.

**Best Practice - I Title: Institutional Healthy Green Lifestyle Objectives: To focus on healthy green lifestyle. To teach the students the importance of the healthy environment. To plant trees for fresh air. Context: A number of trees**

are planted on campus. Nature is a God-given treasure to be prized and cherished by mankind. The rich green trees besides being a feast to the eyes are also the basis of life - for food, fuel and fodder. Life in this world is intertwined with nature - the plant kingdom. In short trees could be aptly called green gold. Trees are a bridge between man and nature. They help man live in harmony with the environment. The largest and tallest living things are trees. The more the trees, the richer the oxygen in the atmosphere. Hence, they enrich the air that human beings breathe. Practice: Caring for the environment is part of being a good citizen. Every little act of ours could save the earth.

Today's young people are tomorrow's citizens, responsible for the healthy growth of the society. It is very essential to equip the young students with better knowledge, attitudes and values. The Eco Club in the institution focuses on clean environment. It is started with a vision of creating environmental awareness among the students. Think globally and act globally. The institution does many environmental activities such as tree planting and fencing rare plants. The institution has a big lush green garden and it has around two hundred species of plants including herbs, shrubs and big trees. Almost thirty varieties of medicinal plants are planted in the Herbal Garden. Six hundred and eleven trees are strategically placed on the premises. The institution has grown fruit bearing trees. When the trees come to fruition, they make a healthy profit. The fruits are plucked and sold for the staff members for a good profit. A congenial learning environment is provided for the students. The institution is beautifully situated in a quiet and peaceful spot. The trees provide shade for the students. During the free time the students sit down in the shade of the trees. They breathe in fresh air. Morning and evening the gardeners' water the plants, weeds are taken out from the ground. Green

Environment Awareness programme is conducted and the students come to understand the importance of an eco-friendly green environment, World Water Day celebration invites to promote awareness of the importance and significance of water and the need to conserve the water resources and to save water for the future generation. Being more concerned about the students' welfare, an Overhead water tank is constructed and purified RO water is supplied all day and the waste water from the RO plant is used for watering the plants and the trees in the premises. Not wasting the rainwater, through six rainwater harvesting plants, the water that has fallen as rain is saved to increase the groundwater level and to preserve the magic liquid during the time of inadequacy of resources on the campus. The laboratories are spacious with outlet for exhaust fumes. They are large and with plenty of space for the students to move around in. They have been cleaned and aired. They have a lot of space inside that allows good natural light and fresh air to come in. There is a special underground drainage system in the chemistry laboratory to dispose the effluent-liquid waste through sewage disposal. Students are taught to abolish the use of harmful plastic products and switch on eco-friendly materials. Evidence of Success: . The large number of trees on the campus oxygenate the whole atmosphere and so the students breathe in fresh air.

Distribution of saplings have given a craving for the students to plant flowering plants and trees in their residing places. There is a big change in their lifestyle. Problems encountered: There has been below average rainfall in the southern part and so the institution supplies water to the trees and plants through borewell water. Whether there is rain or sun, the institution is very particular about maintaining the large number of trees and plants. The well-tended garden and the trees provide cool and shady atmosphere to the institution. Best Practice - II Title: Preparing Rural Sportspersons for New Heights Objectives: To prepare the rural sportspersons to reach great heights To train the rural students to be on a par with the students who come from a privileged background To make the rural students enjoy all the benefits and privileges Context: The institution is situated in the rural area and it is easily accessible to the youth of the villages in the southern parts of



Thoothukudi District. Having good mental and physical health, the students from the rural area enter into the institution. The young, fresh-faced students have a strong desire to achieve the highest position and they have a thirst to get the most important rank. They are energetic, talented and committed. They are willing to work hard and so the youthful energy should be utilized. With a talent like this, the sky is the limit. The institution is for the students and it functions round the clock for the students welfare. The young students ask for the moon and the institution channels the youthful enthusiasm into sports and games. Practice: Sports and games play a major role in keeping a person fit and fine. Education without sports is incomplete. The aim of education is the overall development of the personality of man. Sports students have a great future ahead of them. A career as a player requires one hundred per cent commitment. The institution is very particular about the coaching session and the training period and so every morning the students have two hours tough training session. In the Girl's Retiring Premises an open shed is constructed for the girls to work and rest. Additional amenities such as purified drinking water, good toilet facilities and a shed for the two wheelers to girls in their resting place, make the girls premises pleasant and comfortable to study and rest, and give a safe and secure environment.

### **8.Future Plans of Actions for Next Academic Year**

Nazareth Margoschis College at Pillaiyanmanai is a co-educational college of Arts, Science and Commerce situated in rural surroundings. It plays an important role in shaping the whole personality of the youth of the villages in the southern parts of Thoothukudi District. The vision of the college is to impart affordable and quality higher education to the rural pupils to make them responsible citizens of our Country with a constant research attitude. The future plan of the college is framed based on the aspects used to enhance the development of the institution. We would like to introduce more number of new skill based courses and value added courses for the benefit of the students. Feedback from all the stake holders will be collected, analysed and actions will be taken to improve the infrastructure facilities and the teaching learning techniques. All the department staff will be motivated to prepare e-content materials and post them in the websites available. We have planned to organise seminars, workshops, conferences, guest lectures to improve the knowledge of the students in their subjects and make them to prepare effectively for placements and competitive exams. The college planned to arrange study tour for the students for their experimental learning. Planned to conduct bridge courses and remedial

coaching to improve the overall pass percentage of the students. Faculty members are motivated to submit papers in Scopus indexed journals. In addition to Government scholarships and institutional programs department is induced to support the poor students of their departments financially. Eco friendly green environment is maintained by planting tree saplings every year. Green audit is done every year. Energy audit is also conducted to assess the need for more of renewable form of energy. Planned to introduce incubation centres in many departments to train the students as entrepreneur. Planning to improve tie up programmes of MOU with other nearby industries and institutions to enhance the employability of students. Try to increase the production of vermicompost manure in the campus by increasing the area of disposal of decomposable waste produced. Efforts were taken to increase the production of solar energy to improve the percentage of renewable source of energy. It is planned to install a biogas generator from the waste formed from the hostel kitchen. It is planned to construct an underground concrete tank to harvest rain water. The physical science lab can make use of the water instead of purchasing deionised water from the industries. IQAC will initiate the faculty members to get grants from the UGC and other Government agencies to do major and minor projects. The institution planned to apply and get NIRF ranking, ISO certificate and STAR ranking.
